Letter from the Board

Dear Friends:

t's been a tremendous year for the Echo Hill Campership Fund! We witnessed several important landmarks — all made possible by your generosity and commitment to passing on the Echo Hill experience to kids who otherwise wouldn't experience the unique Echo Hill moments that brought us back summer after summer.

First, we were able to send more children to camp than ever before! Seven children went to camp for two- and four-week camperships. One of the children was honored with receiving the inaugural Peter P. Rice, Sr. Campership, which was established in 1996 to honor the memory of Peter Rice, Sr.'s dedication to children. It was made possible by the contributions of his friends and family and the special efforts of Pauline Rice who asked friends to honor her husband's memory by contributing to this special charity. As for the campership kids, they had a great summer, too. These campers continue to contribute to and be rewarded by the Echo Hill experience.

Second, our efforts to reach out to the Echo Hill community resulted in an outpouring of support for EHCF. Our recent letter entitled, *Everything I Ever Needed to Know I Learned at Echo Hill....* brought us responses from many Echo Hillites, reminding us all of the shared experiences from summers on the bay. 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Campership Reflections

l am writing this because I feel it is way past due and because someone thought enough of me and my opinion to ask if I could write about whatever feelings I have about camp, so here goes:

I started camp in the summer of 1994. When I say that it seems so long ago, though it was only 5 summers in the past. I remember how much I talked all the way to camp from DC and though Nicole Halbreiner and I had just met, she listened intently and responded with genuine interest. We stopped in Chestertown for things I had forgotten and kept on to Echo Hill.

When I saw the sign I became excited. Butterflies fluttered around in my stomach and I didn't know what to expect. We drove up to the Driftwood and I was signed-in. The summer flew by in 4 weeks, as I cried myself to sleep 2 nights during the first week, had an extremely bad asthma attack the second week, got all familiar with mosquitoes the third and couldn't imagine leaving by the fourth week. I made friends, my first year at Echo Hill, who encouraged me to do what would've come naturally anyway: die to come back next

Although I did not know if I was worthy enough to return to Echo Hill, someone thought I was and I returned in 1995.

Each summer I went back I took more chances, not limiting myself to certain activities, and had even more fun than the summer before. Each time I came home people wanted to know what it was exactly that made me endure the worst mosquito bites ever known to man, countless emergency room visits for asthma attacks, and many nights pondering over the idea whether I should stay in bed or make the infamous 50 yard dash to the privy. I really could not tell them then and I can't tell you now.

I've taken the good with the bad, the harmony with the heartache, and it hasn't hurt me any. What can I say, some people don't like it, so they don't come back the next summer. Not everyone can look behind the heat, sweat, and mosquito bites to find the love, friendship, and endurance camp brings. After the first summer they simply cannot make it (some don't even make it through the whole
